Fair Oaks Air Crash



On October 24, 1956, 3:05 pm, Colonel William B. Bailey, Commander of the 83rd Fighter-Bomber Wing at Hamilton Field was practicing ground control, instrument landings at McClelland Field in Sacramento. His F86 Sabre Jet flamed out, crashed and burned at the north end of Pennsylvania Avenue after ripping limbs from a large oak tree in the yard of what we know as the Gore house at 4849 Pennsylvania Avenue. The plane plowed into the ground in the yard of Fair Oaks Fire Chief George Payne next door.

According to witnesses, the pilot ejected at 2000 feet and his parachute opened at 200 feet. He was not seriously injured.

"Ripping out four olive trees in Payne's yard, the plane, a boiling mass of flame, disintegrated, throwing torn scraps of metal and parts over a wide area. The plane's huge jet engine skipped like a hurtling boulder approximately 100 yards across a swale and dug into a hillside a few feet from the R. D. Simmons home at 4941 Pennsylvania Avenue."

"The narrowest escape was that of 4 year old Jimmy Blair, son of Mrs. LaVerne Blair, grandson of the Simmons. Jimmy was playing in the front yard of the Simmons home when the plane crashed. He was snatched from the path of the hurtling engine by his grandmother seconds before the flaming chunk of metal crossed the Simmons lawn."





Fair Oaks' Women of Influence: Rebecca Murphy

If you're familiar with Fair Oaks Village, you've probably heard of the Murphy Building which is located at the corner of Fair Oaks Boulevard and California Avenue. What's unusual about this building, is that it wasn't named after a "founding father", but instead a prominent woman in Fair Oaks' history: Rebecca (Johnston Fisher) Murphy.

In 1890, Rebecca was the president of the Council Bluffs Woman's Christian Temperance Union when she met and married 54-year old Francis Murphy. Francis was a prominent temperance speaker and was under contract with the National Christian Temperance League in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania to preach temperance across the country. By the time Francis and Rebecca met, he was world-renowned and had established himself was a "Great Temperance Apostle". Prior to their marriage, Rebecca had established herself as an influential philanthropist and churchgoer in her town of Council Bluffs, Iowa. It was reported that her home was the center of social life and she had already proven her "executive ability in the management of her property and in the leadership of large church organizations". Further de-



fining her character, she was described as "a lover of flowers, a musician, and an artist... in her love of color, she thought it worth while to express her good taste in the choice of attire, and the fact that she dressed with a thought for the harmonies was cause for apprehension on the part of the sort of reformers who make all forms of righteous effort more or less ugly a depressing."

After getting married, Rebecca and Francis announced they were moving to a small temperance community outside of Sacramento, California - Fair Oaks. While Francis preached temperance throughout California, Rebecca established herself in Fair Oaks and built the Murphy Building in 1900. The Murphy building was a commercial building with businesses downstairs and a meeting hall upstairs (San Juan Hall). The Murphy Building was initially located about a quarter-mile from Main Street where most

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businesses in Fair Oaks had been established, but after the Fair Oaks Bridge was constructed and the Fair Oaks Fruit Company was opened on the corner of Pennsylvania Avenue and Winding Way, most businesses moved from Main Street to the "Murphy Block". There's no evidence that Francis was involved in any of Rebecca's business dealings during this time as he was often out of town preaching and relocated to Los Angeles after moving to Fair Oaks.

Rebecca was heavily involved in Fair Oaks affairs and in 1902, she and her friend Fannie Robinson, hopped in a buggy and went door to door inviting the other ladies of Fair Oaks to join



them for a cup of tea and a chat. The ladies of Fair Oaks met in Rebecca's parlor and discussed the formation of the Fair Oaks Woman's Thursday Club which was subsequently founded and lead by Madame Buffum. In 1903, Rebecca's family moved from Illinois and into the Johnston House (now known as the California House) across the street from the Murphy Building. Shortly after her family's arrival in Fair Oaks, Rebecca rejoined her husband in Los Angeles. Francis died in 1907 at age 71 and that same year, a book titled "Memories of Francis Murphy" was published by Rebecca. Rebecca stayed in the Los Angeles area and continued her husband's temperance legacy until she passed away in 1914.

Remembering the Laying of the Clubhouse Cornerstone Sandra S. Navarro, Ph.D.



In April 1955, Mrs. J.E. Holst, Mrs. Horace Massey and Mrs. Robert Bramhall were photographed at a remembrance of the laying of the clubhouse cornerstone of The Woman's Thursday Club of Fair Oaks.

The original Woman's Thursday Club clubhouse was built on the corner of Fair Oaks Boulevard and Bridge Street in 1913 and was used until the property was sold in 1955.

Today, the organization's clubhouse is located at 10625 Fair Oaks Boulevard.

The Woman's Thursday Club was organized in 1902 and affiliated with the state federation of women's clubs in 1903. The club continues to be engaged in community social and civic events.


DO YOU WANT TO GET MORE INVOLVED?
