The Making of a Successful Historical Society... Throw a Party

I find some interesting material when going through the old files down at the History Center. Sandwiched between some old papers were the minutes of the first meeting of the Fair Oaks Historical Society, September 24, 1975, sponsored by the Fair Oaks Recreation & Park District. Thirty-seven individuals showed up and were declared "Charter Members." You'd recognize many of the names. They talked about what they would like the Society to do. Lots of research; no mention of food.

Ten years later (August 1985) the membership attendees had dwindled down to ten people. Yes, folded up in another file were the minutes of that meeting. Planted in the middle of all sorts of suggestions on doing historical research was a suggestion by Marsha Karley that maybe we should have "an open house with a potluck dinner, display of historical photos and artifacts... and a speaker." The group thought that was an interesting idea and decided to hold the event in the Woman's Thursday Club of Fair Oaks Clubhouse. Fifty-five people showed up with their casseroles and salads. It's hard to imagine that many people having dinner at the Woman's Thursday Club.

It was such a success that word spread, and even more people were expected at the next meeting. So, they scheduled it at the Community Clubhouse. Eighty people showed up.

It shows that doing historical research isn't going to draw a lot of people. But, inviting the community to an open house with a potluck, some interesting exhibits and a speaker will draw a crowd. That's our current business model, and it seems to be working.

<u>Vice-President's Message</u> Ron Lingren

If you missed the April meeting, you missed a very entertaining program that highlighted the Sierra Branch of the American Theater Organ Society, the history of the theater pipe organ that is housed in the Fair Oaks Clubhouse, a special performance of the organ, and a chance to see the installation that is packed away around the Clubhouse stage. The story of how the pipe organ came to be housed in Fair Oaks was quite interesting and the musical performance was very entertaining. It took ten thousand hours to complete the restoration and Fair Oaks installation of the organ— the massive instrument originally from a San Leandro movie theater, by way of an interim tenancy at Cal Expo.

The Theater Organ Society performs as part of the Fair Oaks Recreation and Parks District's Silent Movie Nights, with the pipe organ furnishing all the sounds to accompany the old films. The next Silent Movie Night is Friday, January 25, 2019 at 7 pm. (Tickets will be available from the Park District beginning December 13, 2018. \$6 presale; \$8 at the door.)

Old Homes of Fair Oaks Jim Pearce

It's amazing how some old homes slip under the radar. Just when we think we've found them all, up pops another one.



About a month ago, Mike Kashuba dropped by the History Center and asked if we knew anything about his home of over thirty years at 8257 Winding Way. The house is located just west of the Chicago Bridge on the north side of Winding Way, down a long driveway. It's generally down in the trees and can best be seen from the air.

Mike has been remodeling and adding on during the 30 years he's lived there so the current ranch style house doesn't bear much resemblance to the original. But, while doing over the attic, he noticed some really old wiring and thought the house was probably built in the 1920's. The only name associated with the home was Stewart. It shows up on the 1910 topographic map, but Steve Abbott and his group couldn't associate it with any family.

That's where the History Center resources help out. We looked on our property maps, and the owner of the property was Al Heim in 1910 and 1920, and Guy Stewart in 1930.

Alvin Heim lived over near Minnesota Avenue, so he probably owned the property as an investment. It's another story with Guy Stewart. We found information on Guy in the public records. He was born in Placerville in 1889 and died in Fair Oaks in 1960. His wife was Grace N. Williamson (1889–1979). They were married in 1914 and had no children. They are buried in the Fair Oaks Cemetery.

Guy Stewart was a lifelong employee of Southern Pacific Railroad, working in many capacities, including conductor in Tracy and finally as a clerk in the Roseville offices. The house is perfect for a railroad man, shaded by the Chicago Creek with not a lot of acreage to maintain. It's to the upper left of the black dot in the photo above. Winding Way is at the bottom with the Chicago Creek Bridge just off the photo on the right.

He is remembered by a number of old timers as a member of the Rotary Club of Fair Oaks. He was a good friend of Bob Brugger's father, and Lois Frazier remembers visiting the house when she was a teenager. They remember him as living in the house in question in the 40's and 50's. The 1940 census lists him as saying he lived in the same house in 1935. The 1930 census has him living in the same area, probably in the same house, so he probably bought the property in the 1920's.

A curiosity is the existence of another Stewart family buried right next to Guy and Grace. Dexter Stewart, b. 1837 in New Hampshire, his wife Lucy and three daughters. They are buried next to Guy. The daughters— Winifred married Oscar Cavanaugh, Alice married a Mr. Crane, and Sarah Bessie married Clarence Meader. We suspect a relationship but haven't found it yet.
