PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE RALPH CARHART

It is with sadness that I report the passing away of member, Vern Rosevear, Retired Fair Oaks Fire Chief (May 31, 1994) and member and Society Parliamentarian Ted Olson (June 5, 1994). We will miss them greatly.....

For our next meeting, July 26, Program Chairman and Vice President Iva Langness has lined up speakers **CHARLES KANOFF, ROBERT RAYMOND, AND LARRY SMART** to entertain and inform us with tales of days-gone-by in Fair Oaks. In addition, member Russ Olson will brief us on his return trip to Normandy to commemorate DDAY-plus-fifty. Bring your favorite potluck dish and be prepared for a great historical evening.

To help with our Centennial History Book expenses, the Board of Directors has approved a fundraising project -- the sale of **Entertainment** discount books. Sales are on a consignment basis with the Society receiving \$8.00 for each \$40.00-book sold. There is no minimum to sell and it seems this is a good opportunity to generate funds if we can sell the books early. Buy one yourself; give one as a gift to your friends, relatives, neighbors, or clients. SECRETARY'S MINUTES

MARILYN KENDRICK

For the quarterly meeting of April 26, 1994, President Ralph Carhart called the members to order and asked for a moment of silence to honor the memory of Alice [redacted] on, who passed away March, 21, 1994.

Following membership introductions, Ralph thanked the kitchen crew for dinner set-up and clean-up, and the news editor for the current newsletter. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to expand the newsletter to include more historical information and news events as submitted to the editor.

Lois Frazier thanked members who acted as docents for the ~~past~~ quarter and requested names of volunteers for the next quarterly period.

Secretary, Marilyn Kendrick referred the members to their newsletter for the minutes of the previous meeting. The minutes were approved with the following corrections: that the audit performed by Dottie Dykeman was concluded and the treasurer's reports found to be correct; that the structure on the Munson property is a house not a barn; that the officers were installed at the previous meeting.

Treasurer Carol Abbott reported a balance of \$4281.09. A motion was made and approved to pay outstanding bills for printing and mailing (\$49.16), for name tags (\$4.30) and for kitchen supplies (\$27.04).

Centennial Committee Chairman Jeanne Hill announced that a Fair Oaks Historical Calendar will be available at the January, 1995 meeting to officially start the Centennial year. The Committee's first venture will be to sell logo-imprinted coffee mugs at the Fiesta. These sales will reimburse the Society for the cash advance for Centennial start-up fund. T-shirts and buttons will also be on [redacted] le.

Janet McWilliams introduced high school teacher, Art Schaefer and student Hao Nguyen, Del Campo High School, who designed the award-winning Centennial logo and who received a \$50.00 savings bond.

June Melvin, Membership Chairman, indicated that there are a total of 80 members, including new members. A membership list will be published again in the next newsletter. A motion was made and passed to include a name, address, and phone list to be given to members, upon request to June Melvin.

June Melvin will assist President Ralph Carhart in selecting donated Fair Oaks Fire District items to be stored at the History Center. There is a need for volunteers to serve as trustees to preserve the old fire engine. In addition to these donations, Eugene Salomaen has donated a complete collection of Fair Oaks POST and CHRONICLE newspapers and other items.

June Melvin, on behalf of Dorothy McPherson, presented a gift of an old Fair Oaks labelled milk bottle which came from the dairy located at the corner of Greenvale Road and Winding Way.

Centennial Book Committee Chairman, Bob Massey, announced that his committee now included Meg Smart and Lois Frazier.

Don Kenmonth discussed the newly named SACRAMENTO HISTORY NETWORK, identifying their theme for this year: Sacramento County's History of Education. Their purpose for meeting is to provide publicity and publish a newsletter. Some of the Fair Oaks Historical Society members helped serve dinner at the Network's last luncheon. Ralph also added that copies of the HISTORY OF PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS are available as are flyers on upcoming events and on the table at the reception entrance.

President Ralph announced that 40 books were collected at the Historical Society's Christmas Open House, have now been donated to Fair Oaks Elementary School.

The next Cemetery Clean-up Day is scheduled for June 26, 1994 -- 11:00am to 2:00pm. A sign-up sheet is being circulated. This is the way the Society pays the cost of insurance at the Center.

Nancy Sherman shared information regarding the Empire Mine in Grass Valley, which hosts a \$6.00 luncheon and tour -- as an idea for a future meeting. Iva Langness and Dottie Dykeman will have the brochure information upon request.

Bob Massey shared his **HISTORICAL MOMENT**: the early resident apple expert, Percy Days and his making distilled hard cider -- some of which was rumored to have been served at the Federated Church during the October Harvest Festival.

Horace Crandall, Ways and Means Chairman, conducted the raffle and thanked the people who donated the 12 items.

Iva Langness, Vice President, introduced Society member and famous historian and high school teacher, **STEVE ABBOTT**, who gave the members an informative and entertaining talk about his extensive antique apple peeler collection on display.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00pm.

With permission from DOUGLAS DUPEN and WARREN MCWILLIAMS and with few minor changes of sentence structure, I am submitting this very interesting letter with oodles of historical significance for your perusal.....E.N.J.O.Y.....

ATTENTION: MEMBERSHIP CHAIRPERSON

DEAR MS. MELVIN:

ENCLOSED PLEASE FIND A CHECK FOR TWELVE DOLLARS WHICH I AM TOLD IS THE ANNUAL FEE FOR MEMBERSHIP IN THE FAIR OAKS HISTORICAL SOCIETY. I HAVE JUST LEARNED OF THE EXISTENCE OF YOUR GROUP AND AM ANXIOUS TO BECOME ACTIVE IN ITS ENDEAVORS.

MY MOTHER'S FAMILY AND I (MY MOTHER IS 88 AND STILL WITH US) HAVE A LONG RELATIONSHIP WITH THE HISTORY OF FAIR OAKS, INCLUDING ITS FOUNDING. THE GENERAL AGENT IN CHICAGO FOR THE ARM OF THE RAILROAD WHICH DEVELOPED THE FAIR OAKS AREA IN THE 1890'S WAS *MR. JAMES WILSON*. HE RECRUITED A DISTANT RELATIVE OF HIS, *MR. SAMUEL WILSON*, AN EXECUTIVE WITH THE PULLMAN COMPANY IN NEW YORK, TO BE THE EAST COAST SALES AGENT FOR THE FAIR OAKS DEVELOPMENT. MR. SAMUEL WILSON WAS MY MOTHER'S PATERNAL GRANDFATHER.

PART OF THE BUSINESS ARRANGEMENT OF THE DEVELOPER WITH MR. SAMUEL WILSON WAS FOR MR. WILSON TO RECEIVE TWO PLOTS OF LAND IN FAIR OAKS. MR. WILSON THEN ASSIGNED HIS ELDEST SON, *CLARENCE*, TO JOURNEY TO FAIR OAKS AND TO OVERSEE THE PLANTING OF ORANGE TREES ON THOSE TWO PLOTS OF LAND.

MEANWHILE, BACK IN CHICAGO, ONE OF THE DEVELOPER'S FIRST CUSTOMERS FOR A PIECE OF WHAT WAS TO BECOME FAIR OAKS WAS A YOUNG COUPLE RECENTLY MOVED TO CHICAGO FROM ST. THOMAS, CANADA, A *MR. AND MRS. CHARLES CAULFEILD*. THE CAULFEILDS (HER MAIDEN NAME WAS *ELIZA HANVEY*) HAD FIVE CHILDREN: *KATHLEEN, STUART, JACK, HARRY, AND BILL*. CHARLES CAULFEILD WAS A RETAIL PHARMACIST IN CHICAGO IN ILL HEALTH.

THIS CAULFEILD FAMILY DID PURCHASE A HILL FOR A HOMESITE IN FAIR OAKS, LOCATED NORTH OF FAIR OAKS BLVD. AND APPROXIMATELY TWO HILLS DISTANT FROM (WEST OF) DOWNTOWN FAIR OAKS. THEY BUILT A HOUSE WHICH STILL SITS THERE ON THAT HILL, SET BACK FROM WHAT IS NOW MINNESOTA AVE. THE FAMILY OF SEVEN MOVED IN SHORTLY BEFORE THE TURN OF THE CENTURY AND LIVED THERE UNTIL WORLD WAR I. IN THE FIRST YEARS OF THE TWENTIETH CENTURY, CLARENCE WILSON AND KATHLEEN CAULFEILD MARRIED. THEY MOVED BACK TO NEW YORK TO CONTINUE HIS CAREER AS A CONDUCTOR AND LATER, INSPECTOR, FOR THE PULLMAN COMPANY AND TO RAISE A FAMILY. THIS DID NOT WORK OUT WELL, HOWEVER, AND THE FAMILY MOVED BACK TO FAIR OAKS (TO THE CAULFEILD HOUSE) IN 1909 -- THREE YEARS AFTER MY MOTHER WAS BORN.

MY MOTHER, *KATHLEEN LORANE WILSON*, ENROLLED IN AND ATTENDED FAIR OAKS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ON THE "TOP" OF THE TOWN SQUARE. SHE REMEMBERS WALKING THERE EVERY DAY FROM HER GRANDMOTHER'S HILLTOP HOME, DOWN TO FAIR OAKS BLVD, PAST THE BEECHER HOUSE, BACK UP THE STEEP HILL OF THE BUFFUM COLONIAL, AND THEN BACK DOWN TO THE SCHOOL. MY MOTHER ALSO REMEMBERS HER FIRST AND SECOND GRADE TEACHER, LOUELLA HOLTZ, DAUGHTER OF THE TOWN GROCER. (LOUELLA HAD A SISTER, MARY, AND A BROTHER, ALFRED.)

FIVE YEARS LATER, IN 1914 -- THROUGH THE EFFORTS OF HAVEN SARGENT, EMPLOYED IN THE SACRAMENTO COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE -- CLARENCE WILSON ACCEPTED A JOB AS CHIEF COUNTY PROBATION OFFICER FOR JUDGE PETER SHIELD'S JUVENILE COURT. HE AND HIS WIFE KATHLEEN AND DAUGHTER LORANE MOVED OUT OF HIS MOTHER-IN-LAW'S HOUSE IN FAIR OAKS AND INTO ONE HE PURCHASED IN SACRAMENTO. (HIS FATHER-IN-LAW, CHARLES CAULFEILD HAD SINCE PASSED ON.)

HAVEN SARGENT WAS MARRIED TO ADELE BUCKLEY WHO WAS A TELEGRAPHER WITH THE RAILROAD (ON THE EAST SIDE OF THE RIVER) AND WHOM HE MET WHILE COMMUTING TO SACRAMENTO. THE SARGENTS HAD A HOME ON WHAT IS NOW VILLA COURT, ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF THE STREET AND HAD ONE SON, FRANKLIN.

WHILE THE OLDEST OF THE CAULFEILD BOYS, STUART, HAD DIED OF TYPHOID FEVER, THE OTHERS WERE GROWING UP. JACK HAD STARTED OUT DELIVERING GROCERIES FOR THE GROCER, MR. HOLTZ, BUT LATER BECAME A DEPUTY TO SHERIFF WILLIAM GORMLEY IN SACRAMENTO AND LIVED WITH THE WILSONS UNTIL HE PASSED AWAY IN THE 1918 FLU EPIDEMIC. HARRY STARTED OUT MAINTAINING AND DRIVING FAIR OAKS' FIRST STANLEY STEAMER FOR ITS OWNER, MR. ROBINSON, THE PROPRIETOR OF THE LOCAL TELEPHONE COMPANY. HARRY DROVE THE STEAMER DAILY TO AND FROM SACRAMENTO AS A COMMUTE BUS SERVICE. HE BECAME A CARPENTER AND WORKED ON THE FEATHER RIVER BEFORE DIABETES TOOK HIS LIFE. BILL, WHILE CARING FOR HIS MOTHER, WORKED FOR YEARS WITH THE ALMOND GROWERS' PACKING COMPANY IN FAIR OAKS. MOTHER CAULFEILD PASSED ON IN THE WANING DAYS OF WORLD WAR I. SHE HAD SOLD HER HOUSE TO THE BERG FAMILY. (IN YEARS TO COME, MY MOTHER WAS TO BECOME BEST FRIENDS WITH BEATRICE BERG.

AFTER THE WAR, THE WILSONS -- MY GRANDPARENTS AND MOTHER -- DECIDED TO MOVE BACK TO FAIR OAKS. THEY PURCHASED A PIECE OF PROPERTY ON THE NORTH SIDE OF VILLA COURT DIRECTLY ACROSS THE STREET FROM THE SARGENTS' PLACE. THESE TWO PLOTS WERE THE EASTERNMOST TWO ON THE BLUFF. ONLY A RUTTY DIRT ROAD REACHED ON THE BLUFF EDGE. IT WOULD BE SEVERAL YEARS BEFORE THE WILSON FAMILY COULD AFFORD TO COMPLETE THE BUILDING OF THEIR NEW HOME. SO THEY FIRST BUILT A GARAGE ON THE NORTH EDGE, DOWN THE SLOPE, TO WHICH WAS ATTACHED AN APARTMENT WHERE THEY LIVED WHILE BUILDING "THE BIG HOUSE".

DURING THESE YEARS MY MOTHER ATTENDED SAN JUAN HIGH SCHOOL IN FAIR OAKS. SHE WOULD WALK FROM THE VILLA COURT HOME TO THE TOWN SQUARE WHERE SHE WOULD CATCH THE SCHOOL BUS. SHE REMEMBERS FOUR OTHER GIRLS, IN PARTICULAR, WHO RODE THAT BUS AT ONE TIME OR ANOTHER, OVER THE NEXT THREE YEARS: ETHEL AND IVA RICE, WHO LIVED ON A SMALL RANCH ON A HILL EAST OF THE SCHOOL; BEA BERG, WHOSE PARENTS BOUGHT HER GRANDMOTHER'S HOUSE; AND BERNICE FULTON, WHO MARRIED AL VEGLIA, A MANAGER FOR DEPARTMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLES.

DURING THOSE YEARS, MY MOTHER'S FAMILY WAS CLOSE TO SEVERAL OTHERS. THERE WERE THE SARGENTS ACROSS THE STREET. THERE WERE THE GORES AND THE SLOCUMS. MY GRANDMOTHER'S FRIEND HORTENSE GORE MARRIED DON SLOCUM; THE COUPLE EVENTUALLY MOVED TO SEATTLE. HAZEL SLOCUM MARRIED ONE OF THE BROADLEY BROTHERS, EITHER HAROLD OR BOB. (HAZEL AND MY GRANDMOTHER CARRIED ON A ROTATING BRIDGE CLUB

BAR INTO THE 40'S WITH MY MOTHER BEING DUTY DRIVER AND OFTEN SUBSTITUTE BRIDGE PLAYER.) THERE WERE THE BRAMHALLS. DR. BRAMHALL MINISTERED TO MY GREAT-GRANDFATHER BEFORE HE DIED. THE BRAMHALLS HAD A DAUGHTER, ELEANOR, WHOM I KNEW. AND THERE WERE THE HODGES, WHOSE ONE DAUGHTER WAS A SCHOOL TEACHER AND ANOTHER DAUGHTER WHO WAS AN ILLUSTRATOR.

IN 1925, MY MOTHER AND FATHER MARRIED AND ESTABLISHED THEIR HOME IN SACRAMENTO. I WAS BORN IN 1928; MY BROTHER, JACK, IN 1931. DURING THE 1930'S, MY BROTHER AND I SPENT MANY, MANY WEEKENDS STAYING WITH OUR GRANDPARENTS IN THEIR VILLA COURT HOME. WE CAME TO KNOW THE AREA INTIMATELY. WE OFTEN WALKED DOWN THE DIRT ROAD (WHICH IS NOW HOWARD STREET) TO THE SQUARE. WE OFTEN SCALED THE BLUFF DOWN TO THE RIVER. WE OFTEN WALKED DOWN THE DIRT CANYON ROAD NOW KNOWN AS PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE TO THE DUMP AND TO THE SHACK OF THE RATTLESNAKE-VENOM-MILKER, PEG LEG PETE. WE OFTEN SWAM IN THE RIVER UNDER THE EASTERN END OF THE OLD BRIDGE -- NEVER THE "DANGEROUS" WESTERN END.

BY THIS TIME, THE SARGENTS MOVED TO ATWATER AND SOLD THEIR HOME ACROSS FROM MY GRANDPARENTS' HOME TO THE POPOVIC FAMILY. (THAT HOME HAS SINCE BEEN RAZED AND REPLACED.) MY GRANDMOTHER SUFFERED A MILD STROKE IN 1940 AND MOVED IN WITH US. MY GRANDPARENTS SOLD THEIR HOME IN FAIR OAKS, AT THAT TIME TO THE QUACKENBUSH FAMILY.

OUR ONLY CONTACT WITH FAIR OAKS AFTER 1940 WAS MY MOTHER'S DRIVING MY GRANDMOTHER TO THE FAIR OAKS BRIDGE PARTIES, INCLUDING SOME HELD IN THE SLOCUM HOUSE. MY GRANDMOTHER DIED IN 1953.

THIS YEAR, MY MOTHER AND I HAVE BEEN REVISITING FAIR OAKS. WE VISITED THE 19TH CENTURY MINNESOTA AVENUE HOME HER GRANDPARENTS BUILT. WE VISITED MY GRANDPARENTS' HOUSE ON VILLA COURT. WE HAD LUNCH AT THE NEW RESTAURANT IN THE SLOCUM HOUSE AND HAD COCKTAILS IN THE VERY ROOM WHERE MY MOTHER PLAYED BRIDGE 50 YEARS BEFORE.

IT WAS THAT RESTAURANT THAT MY INTEREST IN THE HISTORY OF FAIR OAKS TOOK FLAME. FOR ON THE WALL IN THE FOYER OF THE RESTAURANT IS A CENTURY-OLD PHOTOGRAPH OF A DISPLAY ADVERTISEMENT OFFERING LOTS FOR SALE IN THE AREA AND LISTING "SAMUEL WILSON AND SON" AS EAST COAST AGENTS FOR THE DEVELOPMENT. I WANT VERY MUCH TO OBTAIN A COPY OF THAT PHOTOGRAPH. THE PROPRIETOR OF THE SLOCUM HOUSE, MR. KERRY KASSIS, POINTED ME TO YOUR SOCIETY AS A POSSIBLE RESOURCE. BUT BY NOW I AM MUCH MORE INTERESTED IN MORE THAN THE ONE PHOTOGRAPH. I WANT TO LEARN AS MUCH AS I CAN ABOUT THE FOUNDING OF FAIR OAKS AND ITS DEVELOPMENT DURING THE EARLY PART OF THIS CENTURY. I UNDERSTAND YOU HAVE AN ARTIFACTS DISPLAY SOMETIMES OPEN TO THE PUBLIC. I UNDERSTAND THAT OTHERS ARE AS INTERESTED IN THE BACKGROUND OF FAIR OAKS AS MYSELF.

I LOOK FORWARD TO HEARING FROM YOU AND FROM ANYONE ELSE INTERESTED IN CORRESPONDING WITH MY MOTHER AND MYSELF.




