
History Notes - Women's Thursday Club

The Woman's Thursday Club of Fair Oaks was organized in the summer of 1902. In the early years, members met in the Fair Oaks Hotel and later in the San Juan Hall (above the Fair Oaks Hardware and Variety Store).

The Woman's Thursday Club of Fair Oaks is still active in 2022. The club maintains an archive documenting its 120-year history. This archive includes a red, 4" by 6" booklet of six pages. This particular booklet belonged to Mrs. W.R. Gore who wrote her name across the top of the cover. Contents include a list of the club's officers, committees (Literary Committee, Musical Committee and Social Committee) and committee members.

Additionally, the booklet lists the year's program (November through May) which fea-



tures a classical musical agenda (George Friedrich Handel, John Sebastian Bach, Wolfgang Mozart, Ludwig van Beethoven, Felix Mendelsohn, Frederick Chopin, Robert Schumann, Giuseppe Verdi, and Richard Wagner).

The booklet includes the club's constitution (Article II, "The object of this club is social intercourse and the intellectual betterment of its members") and by-laws (Section 1, "Meeting shall be held at 3 o'clock in the afternoon on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month").

Mrs. Joseph C. Buffum was the club's first president. Thirty-seven members are listed, along with the sentiment, "Fail not for sorrow, falter not for sin, but onward, upward, till the goal ye win." In her club booklet, Mrs. Gore has penciled in seven more members' names.

RFD, Fair Oaks

Ask anyone where the township of Fair Oaks is and you'll probably be told it's the Zip Code 95628. Well, only since 1962 when Zip Codes were implemented nationally. Prior to that, in 1950 RFD numbers were replaced with street names and house numbers. So, not so far back, the mail system was different.

The Fair Oaks Post Office was established by Leonard Shelton in his general store on Main Street in 1896, several months after the first excursion train arrived in Sacramento from Chicago. Shortly after that, the U.S. Postal Service began to implement the Rural Free Delivery Service, picking up and delivering mail to post boxes in front of residences around eastern Sacramento County. RFD #1 (the American River north to Greenback) was serviced by Horace Massey (farmer Bob's father) from 1910 until his retirement in 1956.

We noticed that, among the local Fair Oaks history segments on the website, we didn't have anything on the history of the Post Office, so we cobbled together a complete history. Check it out on the website.





<u>Treasurer's Report - First Quarter 2022 Summary</u> Jim Pearce


